

The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph – December 28 & 29, 2024

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Family is the foundation of civil society, providing a home where love, joy, and sorrow are shared. Without family, humanity would be homeless. It is within the family that we find support, and it is where we live, love, and grow together.

Each year, on the Sunday following Christmas, we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family. This feast invites us to reflect on the quality of our own family life in the light of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. While we might imagine their family life was free from struggles and challenges, the reality was different. The Holy Family experienced both joyful and difficult moments, showing us that faith, trust, and love are vital to overcoming life's challenges.

Mary faced an extraordinary challenge when she became pregnant with Jesus. The idea of a child being born without a natural father was unheard of, and her acceptance of this miraculous situation required deep trust in God's promises. She said, "May it be done to me according to your word" (Luke 1:38). Joseph, a just and compassionate man, could have rejected Mary when he discovered her pregnancy, but instead, he prayed for guidance. He accepted the divine message to take Mary as his wife and welcome the child as the promised Messiah. Joseph's faith and willingness to trust in God serve as a model for all of us.

Despite the challenges, Mary and Joseph's love and trust in God remained unshaken. They endured hardship, such as the uncomfortable birth of Jesus in a stable, and Mary experienced the sorrow of witnessing her son's death on the cross. Through it all, their faith and prayer were their sources of strength. The Holy Family shows us that prayer is essential for enduring struggles and finding solutions.

The Gospel of Luke tells us that Jesus was obedient to his parents and grew in wisdom, favor, and stature before God and man (Luke 2:51-52). Jesus, the greatest person to ever walk the earth, learned many of his virtues from his loving, faithful parents. This highlights the importance of a family's role in shaping the character and values of children.

As Proverbs 22:6 says, "Train a child in the way he should go, and when he is old, he will not turn from it." Parents must create a Christian atmosphere in the home where children can witness the practice of Christian values. If children are grounded in these values, they can face the world with confidence and strength. A family rooted in Christ is one that is unshakeable, no matter what challenges arise.

A Christian family is one where Christ is at the center, and love abounds. When one family member claims to be the center of attention, the unity of the family begins to break down. The family - father, mother, and children - forms the world's greatest team, and the strength of this team lies in sacrificial love. Mutual respect, whether between husband and wife or parents and children, is essential for a harmonious home.

Jesus, Mary, and Joseph lived in peace with one another and with God. Their example of love, faith, and mutual respect shows us how to live in peace and unity within our own families. Let us entrust our families, and all families around the world, to the Holy Family: Jesus, Mary, and Joseph.

I wish you and your loved ones a Blessed **Feast of the Holy Family** and a Joyous and Prosperous **New Year 2025**.



The Holy Family

As a first-time pastor in a parish, I received a phone call one afternoon from a young married couple, "Father, our 2-year-old son drowned in our pool this morning. We are at the hospital. Please help us." I sped over. The little boy was gone, his body cold, slightly blue, laid out on a bed. His parents were distraught and in shock. For the next few years, I walked with the couple along their difficult and painful road. They openly shared with me how they were often tempted to blame and accuse each other for the loss. And yet, by God's grace, their love for each other grew stronger and deeper as the years went by.

The Holy Family was not without its pain and loss, either. Luke tells us, after losing their twelve-year-old son, Joseph and Mary "after three days found him in the temple area, sitting among the teachers..." (Luke 2:46). We don't know specifically what those three days were like for them except for what Mary says: "Your father and I have been looking for you anxiously." The three days of his absence foreshadow his death and burial. His finding in the temple is a kind of resurrection for his family. They had to learn, again and again, that their family was becoming a place where death and resurrection was not only accepted but welcomed and celebrated. But surely they deeply felt the dangerous agony of their loss — just like every couple who has lost a child.

What losses in your experience of family still cause you anxiety? In what ways has God's presence seemingly vanished in your family? Will you keep searching for Jesus? Remember, he will rise and be found. Your family may be suffering, but when he is found, it will be stronger than ever before. — Father John Muir

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
